Act 250

In the spring of 1970, the Vermont legislature passed Act 250, known as the Land Use and Development Act. Development pressures resulting from the opening of two interstate highways, I-89 and I-91 made access to the state much easier for year-round visitors, creating community concerns including road congestion, increased environmental problems, burden on local services, and rising taxes. The law created nine District Environmental Commissions to review large-scale development projects using 10 criteria that are designed to safeguard the environment, community life, and aesthetic character of the state

Act 250 is administered by the Land Use Panel of the Natural Resources Board. The **Division of Regulatory Management and Act 250 Review** in the Agency of Natural Resources reviews Act 250 permits. Permit information is entered into a database and documents associated with a project are scanned. This information is available to the public through the ANR Act 250 database at

Brandon has adopted permanent zoning and subdivision regulations and has elected to remain a "one acre town." Both Development Review Board and Act 250 approval is required. It is prudent that any potential developer speak with Brandon's Zoning Office as well as Bill Burke.
